- Small Grants of £10,000 or less per year for up to three years;
- Main Grants over £10,000 per year for up to three years.

Better Net Awards

UnLtd, together with **Nominet Trust**, has launched The Better Net Awards, a new programme aimed at providing individuals with support and funding to develop and lead internet based solutions to the problems that affect our society. Grants of up to £5,000 will be available. Those who have an established project with wide reach or demonstrate long-term potential, may be eligible for up to £15,000.

To be eligible projects must be original and innovative and meet at least one of the following themes:

- increase education about the internet and information technology;
- promote and address online safety;
- provide an internet based solution to social, educational, health and environmental issues;
- increase digital inclusion and the use of new media for a social purpose.

Biffaward Flagship Scheme

The Flagship programme can provide grants of between £150,000 and £500,000 to support unique and exciting projects which will make a significant impact at regional level. The following two priority themes are supported:

- Rebuilding biodiversity.
- Cultural facilities.

Projects must be based, within 25miles of a Biffa operation and within 10miles of an active landfill. The organisation making the application must be eligible to enrol with ENTRUST as an Environmental Body.

The deadline to submit an Expression of Interest is 1 July 2010. Successful projects will be announced in October/November 2011 at the annual Biffaward Awards ceremony.

Big Challenge 2010

The theme of Big Challenge 2010 is 'Imagine, Involve, Inspire'.

Applications are accepted from individuals or informal groups of young people aged 16 to 25 and resident in the UK with an original project or campaign ideas that will have a big impact and inspire other young people.

Winners will be given a proportion of the £65,000 Challenge fund and receive at least ten months' support which will include one-to-one sessions with the Challenge Manager, support from the Youth Leadership Team, specialist advice from people working in the relevant fields, a two-day training event and other practical guides and toolkits.

The Challenge fund could cover costs such as: marketing activities; travel expenses; training events; volunteer expenses; venue hire; or equipment costs.

Applications will be shortlisted by Big Challenge's Youth Leadership Team before going on to a final online public vote.

The deadline for applications is 6 July 2010 (3 pm).

Church and Community Fund

This scheme provides grants of up to £10,000 to community projects run by parish churches, deaneries, dioceses and other bodies connected to or working in partnership with the Church of England. The types of projects include; employing a youth worker; renovating an old church hall for use as a community centre; providing hot meals for the homeless in a church room.

Projects must promote, aid and further the work of the Church of England. This does not exclude Anglican projects in partnership with ecumenical or other-faith partners but it does exclude projects

run by secular bodies which have little or no connection to the Church of England, overseas projects and projects in which an Anglican body is not a key player at a local level.

Community Sustainable Energy Programme (CSEP)

This lottery funded scheme provides grants to not-for-profit community based organisations to reduce their energy bills and environmental impact by installing energy efficient technologies.

There are two types of grants:

- **Project Development Grants** – To investigate the feasibility of installing any combination of the microgeneration technologies. The maximum grant is £5,000 or 75% of the study cost - whichever is lower.
- **Capital Grants** - For the purchase and installation of any combination of the microgeneration technologies and energy efficiency measures. The maximum grant is £50,000 or 50% of the project cost (whichever is lower).

Eligible microgeneration technologies are: Solar photovoltaics; Solar thermal hot water; Wind turbines; Heat pumps; Automated wood pellet stoves; Wood fuelled boiler systems and Micro-hydro turbines.

Cracking the Code Bursary Scheme

Round 5 of the National Council for Voluntary Organisation's Cracking the Code Bursary Scheme is now open to applications. Bursaries of up to £500 are available to small third sector infrastructure organisations in England with an annual income of less than £500,000.

The bursary scheme aims to support small infrastructure organisations to improve their governance based on all, or any, of the following principles that form part of *Good Governance: A Code for the Voluntary and Community Sector*:

- Board leadership.
- The Board in control.
- The high performance Board.
- Board review and renewal.
- Board delegation.
- Board and trustee integrity.
- The open Board.

Bursaries can be used for a wide range of activities including the following:

- Organising a Board 'Away Day'; bringing in an external facilitator and hiring a venue.

- Training on the latest legal updates or the roles and responsibilities of Board members.
- Getting advice on creating a trustee expenses policy, developing role descriptions for the Board, structuring sub-committees or developing a conflict of interests policy.
- Improving recruitment and induction systems; carrying out a skills assessment, developing a recruitment strategy and creating trustee induction packs.
- Holding a stakeholder forum to improve strategic planning.
- Carrying out a governance review.

The Round 5 deadline for applications is 30 June 2010.

Fidelio Charitable Trust

Get Connected Investment Project (Cycle 2)

This scheme offers capital funding for the registered providers of adult social care to improve access for their users, carers, visitors and staff to information and communications technology (ICT). For Cycle 2 funding is dependent on the size of organisation, to be eligible providers of adult social care need to be:

- Micro and small organisations (employing up to 49 full-time equivalent staff) or domiciliary care agencies with 1–3 branches (can bid for up to £20,000 to improve access to ICT in order to enhance quality of life and/or skills).
- Medium-sized organisations (employing 50–249 full-time equivalent staff) or domiciliary care agencies with 4–20 branches.

Applicants can bid for up to £20,000 to improve access to ICT in order to enhance quality of life and/or skills. Private and voluntary sector adult social care providers must be registered with the Care Quality Commission, Companies House, Financial Services Authority or Charity Commission.

A registered care provider with 250 or more full-time equivalent staff is not eligible for investment in this Cycle, but may be eligible in Cycle 3 or Cycle 4.

The deadline for receipt of Expressions of Interest for Cycle 2 is 11 June 2010. The deadline for full bids is 20 August 2010.

Cycle 3 will be launched in July 2010 and Cycle 4 will open in November 2010.

Harold Hyam Wingate Foundation

The Harold Hyam Wingate Foundation considers grant applications from charitable organisations working in a number of areas, including the performing arts and music. The Trustees meet quarterly to decide grant allocation.

Performing arts (excluding music)

The Foundation has been a consistent supporter of the performing arts. The Trustees intend to maintain that policy with particular emphasis on financial support for not-for-profit companies with a record of artistic excellence that require additional funding, not available from public sources or commercial sponsorship, to broaden their repertoire or develop work of potentially outstanding interest which cannot be funded from usual sources. Assistance will also be considered for training and professional development for creative talent or the technical professions.

Music

The Trustees recognise that music is seriously under-funded in the UK and will consider applications for support in those areas of music performance and education which do not readily attract backing from commercial sponsors or other funding bodies, or which are not eligible for public funding. Priority will be directed towards supporting the work or education of musicians based in, or wishing to study in, the UK, but by no means exclusively so. An important criterion will be whether, in the opinion of the Trustees, the funding sought will make a significant difference to the applicant's prospects.

Royal British Legion: External Grants Scheme

This scheme aims to safeguard the welfare, interests and memory of those who have served in the Armed Forces including, under certain circumstances, other support and defence organisations and the Mercantile Marine (beneficiaries).

Applicants must show that they have tried to secure funds from other sources and, where applicable, should demonstrate either that insufficient funds were available from those sources or provide information on funding that has successfully been secured.

TRBL awards grants to serving units of the Armed Forces and any charitable organisation to further one of more of the following objectives:

- to relieve need and to further the education of beneficiaries and their spouses, children and dependents;
- to relieve need and protect the mental and emotional health of families left by those who have died in service;
- to relieve suffering, hardship and distress to spouses and dependents caused by the absence of those serving in the Royal Navy, Army and Royal Air Force on Regular, Reserve or Auxiliary Engagements and, under certain circumstances, other support and defence organisations and the Mercantile Marine.

Grants may be for the following:

- **Projects**, for example, a particular time-limited activity that benefits ex-Service Personnel.
- **Services**, for example, to provide a support or welfare service.
- **Capital**, for example, to build a facility or to purchase equipment.

There are three grant levels: up to £25,000; £25,000 - £500,000; and over £500,000. TRBL is prepared to make recurrent grants over several years, although three years would be the normal maximum.

Applications can be made at any time.

Funding is awarded to individuals but this is administered separately through TRBL's County Officers and is not covered by this scheme.

SITA Trust Launches New Young Person's Volunteering Fund

SITA Trust has launched a new fund to support volunteering opportunities for young people. The Young Person's Volunteering Fund has been created to assist young people aged 14-25 to volunteer their time to create or enhance facilities that can be enjoyed by the wider community.

Grants of up to £10,000 are available for each project undertaken.

Applicants must be able to demonstrate that:

- young people will be fully involved in the design and development of the project;
- the project is compliant with the rules of the Landfill Communities Fund; and
- the project takes into account the nine principles of volunteering as set out by the Youth Action Network.

Projects must take place within a SITA Trust 'funding zone'. A funding zone is anywhere within a three mile radius of a qualifying SITA UK waste processing location. A location postcode checker is provided on the SITA Trust website.

The first deadline for applications to the new fund is 4 June 2010.

There will be two further deadlines in 2010: 9 August and 11 October.
