## The Surrey Voluntary and Community 2011 Conference

Representatives from a broad cross section of Surrey's voluntary, community and faith sector attended Surrey Community Action's conference on Tuesday, 21 June 2011.

Charities are being challenged to think ahead. Over 150 people from voluntary, community and faith groups across Surrey went to St Saviour's Church, Guildford for Surrey Community Action's annual conference titled **The Next Decade**.

Following an introduction from Surrey's **High Sheriff Professor Michael Joy, OBE**, a panel of expert speakers from the public sector and civil society

analysed the current political and economic climate and its effect on the operational and financial strategies of voluntary organisations. Speakers included **David McNulty**, CEO at Surrey County Council.

The key theme was looking at alternative ways to maximise resources, whilst reducing dependency on traditional grant streams, whether through social

## High Sheriff's youth awards scheme helps Surrey charities

Rob Douglas CBE, the High Sheriff of Surrey for 2010–11 visited Voluntary Action Elmbridge (VAE) on Tuesday, 29 March 2011 to find out about the charity's activities.

VAE's Chief Executive **Carole Ann Roycroft** asked him to explain the role of the High Sheriff and Rob's reply was highlighted in VAE's recent newsletter. It is reproduced here:

"The word 'sheriff' comes from the words 'shire reeve'. When King Alfred and his successors created for administrative purposes the shire or county structure in the 9th and 10th centuries, they created the role of the shire reeve to help ensure that the King's interests were protected and his rule enforced. The role survived the Norman conquest and at its peak the High Sheriff was responsible for maintenance of law and order, the administration of justice, the collection of taxes and even the raising of small forces for the defence of the realm. Over the centuries these powers have been whittled away until today the High Sheriff is a largely ceremonial position. It is still a royal appointment and each High Sheriff serves for one year. I handed over to my successor, **Prof Michael Joy OBE** on 15 April 2011.

Some of the High Sheriff's time today is linked to the historic activities and responsibilities: attending at royal visits; visiting the courts and the prisons; attending military and civic events; but there is also the opportunity to see at first hand the voluntary and charity work that goes on in the county. One of the highlights for me of my High Sheriff year has been this chance to talk to the many volunteers and others who run these activities and organisations as well as talking to many of those helped by them. In addition each High Sheriff has his or her theme for their year; in my case my theme

is around supporting young people – particularly those with difficult or disadvantaged backgrounds – stay in education or get into vocational training or into employment. This has tied in very well with the **High Sheriff's Youth Awards**, a charity started over twenty years ago by the then High Sheriff which provides grants to organisations or events which involve young people who want to help reduce or prevent crime in Surrey. Our charity's strapline is: "Helping young people make Surrey safer". This year we have distributed over £60,000 to organisations across Surrey. These grants range from support for sports projects as diversionary activities, to youth club equipment, camps, and funding classes on financial literacy.

If you are working with a group of young people who need funding to start up a new scheme or to expand an existing project, the High Sheriff Youth Awards scheme welcomes applications for funding from £50 up to £2,000. We are also currently providing grants of up to £3,000 for a local organisation or £5,000 for one with county-wide reach for transition or bridge funding where the sudden loss of public sector funding has left a gap and alternative sources have been identified but are not yet in place.

It's very easy to apply and we assess every project against our criteria before giving funding (where appropriate), usually within weeks. ## Plans for homes in Tatsfield move one step closer

**Surrey Community Action’s Rural Housing Enabler was first approached by Tatsfield Parish Council in 2007 about the possibility of developing affordable homes for local people.**

The work started by undertaking a parish housing needs survey in early 2008. This showed that there were over 20 local households in housing need, as well as good community support for the idea of increasing the number of affordable homes. The parish council was very keen to progress the idea and has been working in partnership with English Rural Housing Association, Tandridge District Council and Surrey Community Action since then in making these homes a reality.

In April this year, a planning application for ten affordable homes was submitted by English Rural Housing Association. It comprises two three-bedroom houses, four two-bedroom houses, two two-bedroom flats and two one-bedroom flats, thereby ensuring it will cater for the different sized units needed by local people.

Homes such as these cannot be sold on the open market, and so remain in perpetuity in the community, reserved for the local community.

Shared ownership homeowners can only ever staircase up to 80% of the value of the property, with the housing association owning the remainder. Strict agreements ensure that local people are the beneficiaries in the allocation of the homes.

At a recent ICM poll of rural residents, 73% of rural residents in the South East said that families and young people were being priced out of the countryside. This is especially true for Surrey and was echoed by one Tatsfield resident who at the consultation event for the scheme stated that the homes would be “a vital addition to the village, otherwise it could become a ‘twilight zone’ and our lovely new school will be wasted”. Surrey Community Action’s Rural Housing Enabler is working with a number of rural communities across Surrey to make schemes such as these happen. ## June was Gypsy Roma Traveller History Month in Surrey

Surrey's main event, **Surrey Gypsy Day**, was held at Bourne Hall in Ewell on Saturday, 25 June 2011. This was the 4th year of the event.

This particular event has grown considerably over the past years and this year consisted of four wagons, cooking over an open fire and singers and musicians entertaining audiences; a wonderful day for sharing culture and traditions. This was very much a family event and it offered the opportunity for both the Gypsy and Traveller community and members of the general public to engage in something positive.

A number of representatives from various statutory organisations, including the police, attended and offered information, advice and support to all. There were representatives from members of the Romany Routes project; some had come as far as Germany, Greece, Romania and Slovenia.

People left the event wiser, entertained and in some cases fed – and hopefully with a more positive view of the Gypsy and Traveller community.

Last year the event concluded with



the South East regional heat of 'Travellers Got Talent'. The last event had 28 entrants and was shown as part of a documentary on the BBC's *Inside Out* programme last October.

There have been a number of positive outcomes from these events where members of the Gypsy and Traveller community have begun to engage with the wider community, barriers have been removed and access to community projects has been gained.

## SMEF holds a needs assessment workshop & a service provider consultation

Surrey Minority Ethnic Forum is a five-year incubation project funded by the Big Lottery to set up a forum for minority communities in Surrey.



As we enter the next developmental phase of the project, we are beginning a series of consultative exercises the first of which – a **Needs Assessment Workshop** – took place on Saturday, 21 May 2011. We are delighted to report that community representatives from the four corners of the county attended. We had provided information on each locality to the groups in advance of the meeting, giving them statistical detail of ethnic minority demographics, educational achievements, health problems, employment opportunities and housing and community safety issues.

The morning session was about groups identifying and prioritising local issues on the broad themes of education, health, jobs/employment, social welfare, housing and community safety. At the afternoon session people

were grouped according to their ethnicity or community of interest. We had Gypsy & Traveller, Black African, Muslim, Baha'i and Nepalese communities who explored specific issues that concerned them touching on racism, prejudice and language barriers. The workshop was well received, some of the comments were "Very useful and interesting", "Thank you, it felt like a world event" and "Brilliant workshop, well done". Many of the attendees felt that the workshop helped to improve their understanding and knowledge and would help to improve their work in the community.

Following on from our Needs Assessment exercise, two weeks later we held a panelled **Consultation with Service Providers** giving our groups the opportunity to raise their issues and start a dialogue that

would improve access for minority communities. Our panelled meeting was also very successful; the broad themes were community safety, youth and education, health, council services and employment. Panel members gave a short presentation on their service and the best ways that communities could access them. Community representatives then had the opportunity to question, challenge and feedback to panel members.

A full report on the issues that our community representatives identified and the responses and input the service provider panels have given will be published on our website in due course. ## From our Community Buildings Advisor

### Bid now to improve your community building

Applications can now be made for Surrey Community Building Grants Scheme 2012–13.

The Surrey Community Building Grants Scheme (SCBGS) had been withdrawn in the light of the local authority spending reviews, but following considerable lobbying, its importance to community buildings was recognised and the scheme was reinstated by Surrey County Council last year. It pays out during 2012–13.

SCBGS is a partnership scheme jointly funded by Surrey County Council and the district and borough councils. It is administered by Surrey Community Action and currently all boroughs/districts are participating with the exception of Epsom & Ewell, Surrey Heath and Waverley.

Grants are available towards:

- providing new community buildings
- extensions to existing buildings
- provision of disability access and facilities
- major structural work
- major refurbishment to hall, kitchens, toilets etc
- unforeseen urgent repairs such as re-wiring or re-roofing
- provision of car parking

Special consideration will be given to applications which are made in order to comply with The Disability Discrimination Act 2004 (part 3). Applications for projects costing less than £10,000 in total will not be considered and grants are not available towards general maintenance work or redecorating.

The applicant must be a non-profit making community based organisation with a constitution, a bank account and at least two years' audited accounts, or in the case of smaller charities, statements of accounts. The building must be actively managed and marketed for use by the wider community when not required by the applicant. Priority will be given to projects for buildings that are used by a wide variety of community groups at all times of the day and those that show a sustainable usage of the building.

Under the SCBGS community organisations may apply to Surrey County Council and to their local district/borough council for up to one third each of the total project cost. The remaining one third or more must be found by the applicant. The maximum grant available from each partner in the scheme is £40,000 but it is unlikely that there will be more than one maximum grant each year.

Applications must be submitted by 31 August 2011, with a decision expected by 1 April 2012. The project must be capable of being completed by 31 March 2013.

### National Minimum Wage set to increase

New hourly rates will come into effect from 1 October 2011 and are:

- £6.08 (currently £5.93) for workers aged 21 and above
- £4.98 (currently £4.92) for workers aged 18–20
- £3.68 (currently £3.64) for workers aged 16–17

### Should you register as food premises?

From time to time we get enquiries about the registration of halls as food premises. Registration is not necessary unless the hall committee is running a community café or luncheon club; it is the organisations using the hall that are regularly preparing and selling food which need to register.

### Updated first aid leaflet available

The Health & Safety Executive (HSE) has updated its **Basic Advice on First Aid at Work** leaflet. This leaflet sets out what to do in an emergency, including how to deal with a person who is not breathing or is suffering from severe bleeding, broken bones and spinal injuries, burns and eye injuries. It also advises on the records that should be kept. ## Communities learn all about the Localism Bill

Over 90 delegates flooded through the doors of ‘Communities In Control’ on Wednesday, 30 March at the Tithe Barn, Loseley Park.

The event was provided by **Surrey Community Action** and the **Surrey County Association of Town and Parish Councils (SCAPTC)**. It aimed to provide parish and town councils and community groups with information on the Localism Bill, and to promote discussion on how we can all work together in securing a bright future for Surrey’s rural communities.

Speakers included **Trevor Leggo**, Director of SCAPTC and **David McNulty**, Chief Executive of Surrey County Council. Trevor Leggo provided delegates with useful insights into the new powers that town and parish councils in particular will be bestowed with once the Localism Bill has become legislation. He suggested that the changes

could mean that their powers are more akin to those of the French *communes*. David McNulty, meanwhile, asked the audience to

be “patiently impatient” with the county council while it is adapting to this new era, but commented that the council was looking forward to working in partnership with the VCF sector and town and parish councils to find innovative ways in which to provide services and facilities.

Asked how the event had gone, one delegate commented that it had
